President's Message

As I write this I note that we have just passed the autumnal equinox, the date when days and nights are the same length. I mention this here to alert you to make sure you have a blow-by tube extension installed on your engine if you have a C7.

Most of the attendees went on the Lulu Lobster Boat Tour in Bar Harbor and raved about it. Belle and I went on that tour three years ago and thoroughly enjoyed it too! We'd recommend it if you are ever in the area.

On our way home we plan to stop at the Alfateers Service Center in Fontana, CA to arrange for minor September 2009 Issue # 25

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servicing of various things on the coach. I have received several complimentary emails about the excellence of their service. The Camp Cook's Corner

For all of us motorhome chefs, I thought it would be nice to include a Recipe in each Newsletter ... maybe something easy to make in the motorhome, good to take to a Potluck or "Heavy hors d'oeuvres", or just a personal favorite. If members will send me recipes (email <u>patty@WeBeSnowbirds.com</u>), I'll include them in future newsletters, but to start, I'll share one of mine. It's easy to make in a Crock-pot, a great way to use leftover rotisserie (deli) chicken, and folks always say it's yummy. And so good for those cool Autumn evenings!



Crock-Pot White Chili Serves 6 - 8 (contributed by Patty Rowe)

Ingredients

- 4 cans (14 ounces each) Great Northern beans (or navy, cannellini or other white beans)
 2 cups diced, cooked chicken
 3 cups chicken broth
 2 medium onions, chopped
 2 cloves garlic, minced
 2 cans (4 ounces each) diced green chilies
 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
 2 teaspoons ground cumin
 1 - 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
 1/4 teaspoon chili powder
 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- Salt to taste

Preparation

1. Place beans (drained and rinsed), chicken, and chicken broth together in crock-pot.

2. Saute chopped onion and garlic in oil until transparent.

3. Add spices and green chiles to onion mixture and stir well.

4. Add to crock-pot mixture and stir well. Cook in crock-pot on low for at least 2 hours.

Garnish with sour cream, chopped green onions and Monterey Jack cheese if desired.

Good served with fresh French bread.

The Wandering Lifestyle an Article by Tom Cullen, your Editor's neighbor at Outdoor Resorts Indio

There are some dedicated motor-coachers wandering out there on the byways of North America. They may or may not wander with a schedule, or a destination, or even an overall plan. They're pursuing a lifestyle of freedom, wherein they alter their direction, or their next intended visit, based upon weather, personal preference, missed turnoffs, or just plain "ants in the pants."

These wanderers rarely make reservations for RV parks, preferring to wing-it, taking their chances with last minute decisions. There's always an RV park at the end of the trail, or in a rare instance of getting "skunked", there's a casino or a Wal-Mart, or other suitable dry camping. Flexibility overcomes all !

Coaching nomads go with the flow. They believe that the freedom to wander without the stress of a schedule is worth the uncertainty of the destination. Some of these nomads shift from place to place on a daily basis, while others make less frequent moves. Most small towns are worth a day or two, while Metropolitan areas may rate a week, and many RV parks offer seven days for the price of six. Restless travelers have a way of working out their own scheme.

Traveling "Free as a Bird" is not for everyone, but many who lived a career of stressful structure and tight schedules, strive for a life of limited structure and loose schedules. Many of these folks can be found roving the northern climes in the Summer, and strolling in the south during the Winter. They migrate the same time and direction as Canadian Geese.

Meandering means different things to different RVers, but most meanderers get off the Interstates and onto the US Highways, the State Highways, Scenic Routes, and even county roads. They study maps, and range toward interestinglooking areas without taking into consideration the travel time from point A to point B. They seek out small, curvy roads, even roads with no white line in the middle, and unmarked roads as they wend their way through interesting areas. Remember the bumper sticker "Hopelessly lost, but making good time?" Many Wanderers would consider "hopelessly lost" a better alternative than "making good time."

The next time you sign up for a motorhome rally, try leaving a week earlier than you would normally leave. Consider it a pilgrimage to a rally, by way of "here, there and everywhere." Look for an interesting route off the beaten track, but don't get married to the concept. Plan on averaging 200 miles or less per day so you can roll into an RV park in early afternoon (while they still have spaces empty), use the rest of the afternoon for a nap or a tour of the area, and the evening is free for whatever activity you wish.

Disconnecting the tow car and cruising your new location is the other part of the wandering equation. Soak up all the local culture you can find. If you go out for dinner, look for a restaurant with a counter, where you can eat, drink and meet interesting characters.

Tomorrow will be an all new adventure as you gallivant toward the rally. And for tomorrow's travel, plan on ambling, rambling, straying, traipsing and tramping through countryside that nobody you know has ever seen. Your motorhome will truly be a "Home on the Range" as you pursue the vagabond lifestyle of wandering.

Try it, you might like it ! Life is an adventure and motorhoming can be an adventure too. You've probably heard the old saying, "It ain't the destination, it's the journey."

Featured Video: How to Handle a Kitchen Fire

I never realized that a wet dishcloth can be a one-size-fits-all lid to cover a fire in a pan! This is a dramatic video (30-second, very short) about how to deal with a **common kitchen fire** ... **Oil in a frying pan**. Read the following Introduction, then watch the show... It's a real eye-opener!

NEVER throw water on a grease fire !!! At the Fire Fighting Training school they would demonstrate this with a deep fat fryer set on the fire field. An instructor would don a fire suit and, using an 8 oz. cup at the end of a 10 foot pole, toss water onto the grease fire. The results got the attention of the students. The water, being heavier than oil, sinks to the bottom where it instantly becomes superheated. The explosive force of the steam blows the burning oil up and out. On the open field, it became a thirty foot high fireball that resembled a nuclear blast. Inside the confines of a kitchen, the fire ball hits the ceiling and fills the entire room.

Also, **do not throw sugar or flour on a grease fire.** One cup of either creates the explosive force of two sticks of dynamite.

Camping and Park Memberships An Article by John Bohn, Alfa Seeyas President

There are a variety of money-saving clubs and memberships out there that can help reduce the cost of space rentals in campgrounds and RV parks. When first entering the RV traveling scene in 2005 we were perplexed about which of these, if any, to buy or join. I am sure some of our members may have faced the same quandary.

The purpose of this article is to provide a resource to assist fellow Alfa owners in making a decision about which programs might work for them. DISCLAIMER: I am by no means an expert on this subject. All of the opinions expressed are solely my own, and are based on my experiences and research over the last several years. If there are any inaccuracies, I will be happy to make corrections in later newsletters.

You first need to determine what kind of RV'r you are! Full-timer, sightseeing traveler, weekend warrior, etc. How frequently you travel, how often you move locations when traveling, and how long you stay at each place are critical to the decisionmaking process. Please keep that in mind as you read on.

There are several types of clubs/memberships, each with its own restrictions and regulations that should be considered based upon your particular travel habits. I have arbitrarily divided the membership choices based on the following:

- Daily discounters
- Weekly/Monthly timeshares
- Ownership timeshares

DAILY DISCOUNTERS

These clubs typically provide a discount of 50% off the regular daily rate. However, each location in the group of parks is allowed to determine when those discounts may be applied. In most cases the discount applies for one or two nights, up to a maximum of five. There are exceptions. Be aware that many campgrounds are listed as participants in more than one of these groups, so there is a lot of overlap. Three dominate this category and have a yearly fee of about \$49.95. Another smaller company is listed last.

Camp Club USA (www.campclubusa.com)

They advertise over 1000 participating campgrounds, and that all of their campgrounds are rated by Woodall's.

Happy Camper (<u>www.camphalfprice.com</u>)

They advertise 1200 participating campgrounds throughout the U.S. and a few in Canada.

Passport America (<u>www.passport-america.com</u>)

They advertise 1558 participating campgrounds throughout the U.S., Canada, and Mexico. Campground quality and available amenities (pools, laundry rooms, etc.) vary widely.

Recreation USA

(www.campingandcampgrounds.com)

They advertise campgrounds as low as \$10 per day. I was not aware of them when I began this article, but I checked out their website and would probably have joined them had I known of them 5 months ago. Their membership is \$34/ 6 months or \$44/year. They don't have as many member campgrounds as the others above, but their rates are less, and their restrictions on length of stay appear to be more generous.

WEEKLY/MONTHLY TIMESHARES

These operations are designed to satisfy the needs of people who typically stay at one location for an extended period of time (one or more weeks like many full-timers), and in many ways are like

timeshares. There is a large initial purchase fee (thousands), then ongoing monthly or yearly maintenance fees. Different levels of memberships may be purchased, usually depending on the desired length of stay, or time between visits. Like timeshares, there are brokers who deal in these memberships. One such online broker is:

www.rvparkstore.com/campground_memberships.

<u>htm</u> I am not recommending them, I only include their address as a resource of information. If you decide to look into one of these types of memberships be very careful and read all the fine print. Internet searches will provide a large amount of information. Make sure it will really work for you before you purchase.

The major benefit of these groups is that you don't pay anything while staying as it is all prepaid in your membership. (However, I have heard recently that some parks do charge various fees, depending on the specific membership owned.)

The majority of campgrounds for these clubs are located in the western U.S. There are two major companies:

Thousand Trails (TT) (<u>www.1000trails.com</u>)

Their website states: "over 80 preserves in 22 states and British Columbia, Canada". However, some of these do not accommodate motorhomes.

Western Horizons (WH) (<u>www.whresorts.com</u>)

Their website claims: "The Western Horizon system, consists of 20 recreational properties, in 10 states with 3,000 RV sites and numerous rental trailers & cabins." They also state that for an additional "nominal" fee you can have access to over 650 other non-affiliated campgrounds.

Ownership Timeshares

Under this group are RV Resorts where you

actually purchase a lot. As you might imagine, these cost 10's of thousands of dollars depending on the location of the lot and the amenities provided. They are really designed to accommodate "snowbirds". Usually, owners may allow their lot to be used as a rental site by park management, and part of the rental income is credited back to the lot owner. In some parks, owners sublet their lot directly to others for medium to long term use.

In Our Case

Belle and I decided not to purchase any of these timeshare-like memberships, because they do not fit our usual mode of travel. We rarely stay in one location for extended periods. Instead, we typically drive to an area and stay for a few days while using our "toad" to visit surrounding places of interest on day-trips

However, we did purchase a Resort Parks International (RPI) membership (a group similar to the WH and TT memberships listed above) for about \$250. We thought this would provide access to a wide variety of parks all across the U.S. as it also gave us the availability of Coast to Coast and their affiliated Encore Parks. (These had annual renewal fees: RPI \$65, Coast to Coast \$75.) We found these to be inconvenient to use in our situation and have discontinued membership in them. (In addition, we found that many of the parks in the Coast to Coast and Encore systems were also Passport America parks.)

The single best membership <u>for us</u> has been Passport America. It costs about \$49 per year and provides a 50% discount at participating campgrounds. Indeed there are various restrictions at some of their campgrounds, but

they are noted on their website as well as in the campground directory they provide with the membership.

In addition to the above, the following information may be helpful:

Elks Club members have sites available at <u>very</u> reasonable rates at many Elks facilities.

Retired Military members can stay at many military base campgrounds for **very** reasonable rates.

Wal-Mart stores allow free overnight parking at many of their stores, but an increasing number of towns are passing local ordinances that prohibit it. Be sure to check with the store manager before staying! There is a Wal-Mart store locator online, and you can call ahead to be sure.

Other retail stores such as **Home Depot**, **Cracker Barrel** and **Cabela's** <u>may</u> allow overnight stays for free, but again, please make sure to check with the store manager before doing so.

Indian Casinos frequently have free overnight parking, and some have RV sites with hook-ups at little or no cost.

Federal, State and Regional (County) Parks, and Army Corp of Engineers facilities are scattered all over the U.S., and their fees are very reasonable. Amenities vary widely, but they are frequently located in great locations for those who love to be in the great outdoors. (www.reserveamerica.com)

Kampgrounds of America (KOA) has a large network of campgrounds, but their Value Kard only provides a 10% discount on comparatively expensive campsites. However, they usually have great amenities and activities for those camping with grandchildren!

The **Good Sam Club** membership also provides a 10% discount at many campgrounds.

Other Useful Sites:

www.reserveamerica.com ("Reservation central" for many national and state park campgrounds). We found that parks frequently had "drive-up" space available when the reservation service said there were no more advance reservations available. There appears to be some duplication for federal parks between this site and the next one listed below.

www.recreation.gov – Until recently there were two different websites that administered reservations for federal camping facilities. They have now been combined into this website, and if you had a ReserveUSA.com or Reservations.NPS.gov membership they will not work here. You must establish a new membership identity.

Camping at Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation, US Army Corp of Engineers, USDA Forest Service and National Park Service are all done through this website.

<u>www.freecampgrounds.com</u> (Camping for \$10 or less.)
