John Bohn sent in this tip: "Not so elegant," he says, "but it works!"

John fashioned some "hat-hangers" out of ¾ inch wide brass metal stock that Ace Hardware carried in 12 inch lengths. He cut each 12-inch section in half, then bent them as shown in the photos below so they would hang from the "fishing-pole rack" in the coach. He filed the edges to eliminate sharp corners, etc.

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Caterpillar seminar tidbits: -- reported by John Bohn

SCA test strips are now available in quantities of 10 from caterpillar (formerly only available in batches of 50---10 pack part # 4C9297). Be sure to test your coolant at least once per year. These strips make it simple and easy, assuming you can get the strip down into the coolant in the tank above the engine. You may need to dip the coolant with your finger and apply it to the test strip. Be sure your fingers are clean when you use this method. You may be able to find test strips in small quantities at Napa or AutoZone parts stores. If you are using Extended Life Coolant, you do not need to test for SCAs!

At a recent rally I observed several people warming their engines until the engine temperature gauge reached its normal level. It is NOT necessary to warm up your engine for more than a few minutes, unless you are planning on immediately driving under heavy load conditions (such as climbing a steep hill). For cooling down the engine, if you are pulling into a rest stop after traveling at highway speeds, let the engine idle for 3–5 minutes before shutting it off to allow the turbo charger temperatures to decrease. If you have been driving through city streets, on the way to an RV park for example, you don't need to let the engine idle when you stop.

The majority of C7 engines were built with shallow sumps, requiring only 19 quarts of oil, rather than the 28 quarts for the deep sump variety. The problem is that the engine dipsticks are supplied by the coach manufacturer (in our case, Alfa Leisure) as its length depends on where and how they locate it in the coach. In most cases, Alfa Leisure apparently supplied the wrong dipsticks, and they need to be re-calibrated for the shallow sump. If not, your oil change may result in an overfill with the excess oil blown out through the breather tube, SUCKED INTO THE RADIATOR, and all over your tow car. When I had my dipstick recalibrated, they placed the new marks on the backside of the dipstick. Twice since then Freightliner facilities have still overfilled my engine, not realizing the correct markings were on the backside. Solution: grind off the markings on the original side with a file or Dremel tool.

Fogged Windows

At the Indio FMCA rally many coaches had fogged windows repaired by Joe Colvin, owner of Auto Glass Boss, from Phoenix, AZ. At the rally he repaired over 20 panes on various coaches at a cost of \$100 per pane. Many of us were under the impression that Western General would cover the repairs, less a deductible, but that turned out not to be the case.

Joe did an excellent job of taking care of all coach owners and will be available at the Tucson Alfa Annual Rally for others needing fogged windows repaired.

I had one fogged window fixed and will let you know if it continues to be a good repair in future newsletters. -- John Bohn

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Engine Woes! — an Article by John Bohn (that he probably would rather not have written)

My 2005 CAT C7 "blew" in Massachusetts August 21. Cause: a build up of "crud" in the radiator as a result of the blow-by tube not being extended past the radiator's air intake, along with a trip across the "Top of the World" highway in Alaska that was 70 miles of extremely fine dust. I spent 4 hours trying to clean the radiator using a pressure sprayer at a car wash before leaving Alaska, and thought I had it pretty clean. I didn't!

In Massachusetts, a Freightliner dealer rebuilt the engine but installed a cylinder insert in #6 that was .013" too short. When installing the pistons, this tiny gap apparently caused breakage of the top piston oil ring, and went un-noticed. Approximately 800 miles later, the cylinder blew again, and caused an over-pressurization of the entire coolant system, that in turn blew out the heater coils in the front of the coach. This occurred in Ohio, where a CAT dealer did the second rebuild and replaced the heater coil.

We drove the coach to San Diego, approximately 3000 miles, and it seemed to run fine, though I was hearing some knocking noises periodically at start up. I took the coach into the local CAT dealer and they discovered the #6 cylinder was again scored, and that metal filings were in the injector pump. They replaced the injector pump and are currently rebuilding the engine. The previous CAT dealer used a tool that allowed them to bore out the cylinder without pulling the engine (to save time and money). According to the San Diego CAT dealer this always results in metal filings going everywhere, so they do not use that method.

Thankfully, all of this is being covered by Caterpillar under warranty.

Lessons learned:

Insure that your blow-by tube extends past the radiator air intake! Keep that radiator clean!

Because of the configuration of the C7 engine in our coaches, you cannot get to the front side of the radiator to clean it, and are forced to try to clean it from the rear. Now that mine is known to be very clean, I plan to keep it that way by cleaning it regularly from the rear. To properly clean a badly soiled radiator requires that it be removed from the coach, along with the intercooler, at a cost of somewhere between \$1500 and \$2500 dollars.

At the first rebuild, the Freightliner people extended the blow-by tube, but now I sometimes get residue on the tow car. Caterpillar has a solution for this in the form of a Mist Filter System (Part Number 269-2002) that takes the blow-by fumes and re-circulates them back into the engine. The cost of this system is about \$350 for parts and \$200 installation labor. It also contains a filter that must be replaced every 3-5 oil changes (I don't know the cost of the filter). A second option I discovered through the FMCA magazine is a new item on the market from a company in Arizona. This unit costs only \$29.95, and consists of a hard plastic box with inlets and outlets to facilitate the flow of blow-by fumes. Ideally, the oil particles will coalesce in the box, and then can be drained periodically. I don't know if this will work, but I have purchased one and plan to install it soon. If it works I'll let you know in the next newsletter. The website for this item is:

Whatever you do, **KEEP YOUR RADIATOR CLEAN!** If you have any hint of abnormal increased engine temperatures, consider getting the radiator professionally cleaned.

Fire Safety Tips

At the recent Indio FMCA rally, Mac McCoy, known as <u>Mac the Fire Guy</u>, addressed our group at the coaches and pointed out that we should routinely open the fire escape window in our bedrooms and lubricate the rubber with 303. Indeed, one of our group tried opening their window and it wouldn't budge. In addition, Mac advises keeping a stick equal in length to the height of the window that can be placed as a brace to hold the window open when having to use it as an escape route, and using the bedding to lay over the opened window edge before exiting!
